Some Short Notes from the July Board Meeting

At the Fellowship Board of Trustee's July meeting Bill Robertson reported the results of the mail ballot for members of the Religious Education search committee. There was a good ballot response and the fellowship members recommended by the Nominating Committee were unanimously approved.

The search committee members are; Leslie Jones, Esther Kaplan, Sabine Omvik, Joe Rafferty, Kristina Strand and Victoria Ingram, Minister

Board meetings are normally held on the second Thursday of each month at 7:00 p.m.. The board has decided to reschedule the August board meeting for the third Thursday, August 16 to officially welcome Victoria Ingram. Victoria begins her ministry with us on August 15.

Written evaluations of the past Interim Year were also discussed at the July board meeting – one prepared by our Interim Minister, Carolyn Colbert and one prepared by a trio of active Fellowship members selected by the board. Both evaluations were very positive and reflect the progress we have made as well as optimism for the future. The member's evaluation was very complimentary and appreciative of Carolyn's work with us this last year. The two independent evaluations were in remarkable agreement. Both have been sent to the UUA's Department of Ministry and to the Pacific Central District.

It was also noted that the Fellowship's preliminary 2006-2007 year-end financial results showed a surplus of \$4,463. The surplus will be transferred to the Fellowship financial reserves. On another financial note, the potential 2007-2008 budget shortfall originally estimated at \$14,391 has been further reduced to \$6,576.

Report to the Fellowship on General Assembly in Portland

Katie Rall and I spent four very busy days at UUA General Assembly in Portland, Oregon in June. Imagine spending four days and nights with about 6000 other UUs – the cream of the UU crop, all as smart, dedicated, and earnest as you think they would be. I came away feeling very proud of being a Unitarian Universalist. Proud of belonging to such a talented, worthy group of people.

The convention center in Portland is very large, and it took us a while to figure out where everything was and how to get there. Lots of stairs and escalators. But the workshops and other sessions were very well organized and things became easy by the last day.

We were both delegates from our Fellowship which meant we got to vote on the decisions made in the “plenary sessions”. Those are sessions at which the business of the convention is done. The biggest decision we got to decide on was the Statement of Conscience which is made by the denomination to the general public. It was on “Moral Values for a Pluralistic Society”, and in about 15 paragraphs proclaimed our moral positions, contravening the religious right’s insinuations they are the only religion with moral principles. It was impressive and inspiring to see how the substance and wording was arrived at. Democracy in action!

There were lots of workshops on a wide variety of subjects from “Congregational Singing” to “Near Death Experiences & UU Spirituality”. We got to hear marvelous speakers: Thom Hartmann, the talk show host, Robert Fulghum, UU minister and writer, David Korten, author of “The Great Turning”, and Professor Rashid Khalidi, an expert on middle eastern history.

It rained only the last day, and not very much.

Katie got to carry our Fellowship Banner in the parade of banners at the opening session, one of several hundred banners from the societies attending.

We saw many old friends – Norm & Joanne Crane, Julie Springer. Of course Carolyn was there, and Victoria, and Erika, and Parisa (who I didn’t get to

see), but Katie did. Bill Scarvie put on his workshop which was so popular none of us could get in.

We’re not isolated here in Los Gatos. We’re part of a much bigger entity, one we can be proud to belong to.

Next year the convention is in Florida. If you’re going...you’ll LOVE IT!

Call for Gardeners (and Irrigation Monitors)

The Building and Grounds committee needs volunteers to help with the Fellowship landscaping. For many years, Ruth Webb and others have taken great care of our grounds, including monitoring and maintenance of the automated drip watering system. Ruth has done an outstanding job but is no longer able to carry the burden for the rest of us.

The Fellowship employs a part-time gardener but the grounds need volunteers to identify, organize and coordinate special tasks. Monitors for the watering system are also needed. We’ll be giving some TLC and much-needed paint to our sacred space in the early Fall. Dates for a planning meeting and painting party will be announced soon.

HEALTHCARE REFORM

Thanks to all of you who stopped by the Social Justice table to write get well cards to your state Senators asking for healthcare reform in California this year. We sent over 30 cards to Sacramento and added our voice to this important debate.

GLOBAL WARMING CHALLENGE PROJECT

The 'official' kickoff of the Social Justice Associate's challenge project will be Sunday Aug 5. We'll have detailed handouts with everything you need to start meeting the challenge! Most of us recognize the seriousness of global warming and the need to take actions to reverse the trend. But breaking habits is hard. The goal of the global warming challenge project is to encourage people to DO things that help. A secondary goal is to get people to THINK about the impact of what they do on global warming; the more it is on our minds in our daily lives the better. Hopefully most of you will tackle most of the challenges this year. It is a little work ... but worth it!

We announced our 1st challenge (air drying laundry) in the July newsletter but decided it would be best not to add a 2nd challenge before the kickoff. That gives you all a little more time to get and install your clothes lines (or do so for a friend or relative if you already have yours). See overview of Challenge #1 in the July newsletter. More detailed information will be available at the Aug 5 kickoff and on the deck and a couple of times a month from then on. Once our webpage is available, it too will have detailed information on the global warming challenges including links to resources.

After that, we plan to introduce a new challenge every month. Each challenge will have an 'immediate' action that is feasible and concrete (something to DO, not just a promise). When you've complete the action you sign your name to our list of "challenge meeters".

Most challenges will also have a "follow-up action" that involves an ongoing action over a prolonged period with the goal of firmly establishing good new habits. For example, for challenge #1 it is to air-dry at least 4 loads of laundry a

month (or equivalent) for 3 consecutive months. When you've completed the follow-up action, you sign your name again for doing that.

All challenges will continue until July 2008 and you may complete any challenge at any time. We will continue to have information on all challenges to date on the deck and on our website (once it is up). So there will be lots of opportunities to make a difference!

A FEW QUESTIONS ON GLOBAL WARMING CHALLENGES

Q: Can I sign the chart if I already implemented the action before the start of the challenge?

A: Congratulations on being ahead but the answer is "NO". The goal of the challenge is to improve upon the existing situation and thus you must do something new

Q: Isn't that unfair?

A: Not really. There will always be at least one alternative action you can substitute. Often it will involve having a friend or relative do the action. So you have lots of opportunity to meet the challenge.

Q: It seems like it might be difficult to do follow-up actions all the time over an extended period. Can I skip once in a while and still get credit for doing the follow-up action?

A: The follow-up actions will be worded to allow some flexibility. For example, for challenge #1, you need to air dry 4 loads of laundry a month...you can miss a week or two and still meet the challenge by catching up later in the month.

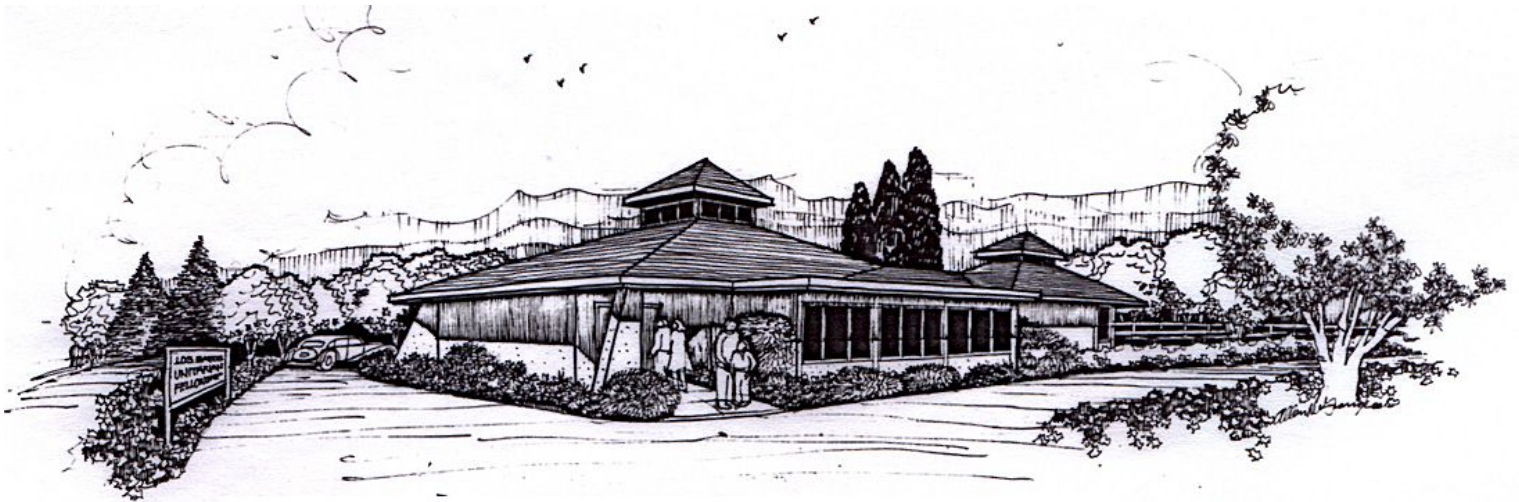
