This month, the Sunday service offertory on May 20 (except for checks and envelopes marked "pledge"), will go to the National Alliance for Mental Illness, Santa Clara County.

NAMI Santa Clara County offers practical experience, support, education, comfort and understanding to anyone concerned about mental illnesses and their treatment in Santa Clara County. In addition, they work with public organizations, private businesses and the media to increase organizational and personal knowledge of effective ways of treating the illnesses while advocating for increased research and improved services for individuals with mental illness.

NAMI is a nonprofit, grassroots, self-help, support and advocacy organization of consumers, families, and friends of people with severe mental illnesses, such as schizophrenia, schizoaffective disorder, bipolar disorder, major depressive disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder, panic and other severe and persistent mental illnesses that affect the brain.

Founded nationally in 1975, today NAMI works to achieve equitable services and treatment for more than 15 million Americans living with severe mental illnesses and their families. Hundreds of thousands of volunteers participate in more than one thousand local affiliates and fifty state organizations to provide education and support, combat stigma, support increased funding for research, and advocate for adequate health insurance, housing, rehabilitation, and jobs for people with mental illnesses and their families. –UUFLG Social Action Committee

### Good Times at UUFLG Day in the Redwoods

To celebrate Earth Day, the Social Action Committee held a UUFLG Day in the Redwoods at Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park on Saturday, April 14. Thank you, Ellen Hill, for your tremendous work in organizing this day!

All ages and abilities participated, from children to seniors and from those running in circles to those being more cautious with a cane.

We started out with a self-guided tour of the Redwood Grove trail. We explored, talked, played, and learned about the forest and the life it sustains, including banana slugs! Katie Rall informed us that these beautiful, bright yellow, slimy, slithering, redwood natives are the mascot for U.C. Santa Cruz. Also, if you lick one your tongue will go numb! Ask Katie how she knows that last tidbit.

Of course, we enjoyed viewing the magnificent redwood trees, which can live to be 2,000 years old. They demonstrated with a rare albino redwood how survival depends on maintaining hope and helping each other. The albino, which is white because it doesn't produce chlorophyll, can't survive on its own. Its neighbors reach out with their interconnecting roots network and provide what it needs to thrive, a lesson we can all learn from.

After the tour, we met up for a relaxing picnic lunch and everyone talked about how we should visit the forest more often. Following lunch, Rev. Fa Jun led us in a brief, perfect

meditation to round out our day, with all ages standing in a circle and holding hands, connecting with each other and with nature.

Our time together in the forest renewed our spirits, to show us that we truly are all interconnected, and to reassure us that together we can make this a better world. We must follow the example of the redwoods by networking, sustaining each other, and never giving up hope.
