It is a community drop-in center and mental health program for LGBTQ, questioning and ally youth, and young adults ages 13-25 in Santa Clara County. The Space is open 3-9p weekdays, offering a safe and confidential place for support groups, art workshops, activism and leadership opportunities, movie nights, field trips, open mic nights, volunteer opportunities, safe-sex supplies, and monthly health van visits.
